- 1. A & B: How did you come to work in the insurance industry? Purely by accident. I was working my way through school part time at a law firm and I enjoyed it immensely. I was fascinated by the law and wanted to secure employment with a larger law firm and perhaps pursue my legal education. For my first full time job I had scheduled an interview at a law firm, and another interview for a position at an insurance agency. Coincidentally, the insurance agency was across the hall from the law firm. Interviewed with law firm first, then went across the hall to the agency. Told the agency principal I had interviewed at the law firm and he suggested I might not want to work at THAT law firm, too much turnover, lead attorney not the nicest person etc. He also told me insurance was much more interesting than law. I ended up taking the position at the insurance agency. Funny thing, in my first month at the agency the law firm had about 5 employees come and go, one left at lunch and never came back. So, it was a good decision.
- 2. A & B: What is the most challenging aspect of your job? There are new challenges every day. That's what keeps it interesting. I do a lot of non-standard type business, so finding markets is always a challenge.
- 3. A & B: What aspect of your work as a broker do you find the most rewarding? I truly enjoy my relationships and friendships with my clients! I enjoy helping them understand their insurance coverages, their contractual obligations, and learning and understanding their businesses.

The loss of institutional knowledge is huge right now and it is going to continue to be huge over the next few years. Our local CPCU Chapter partners with three local universities with Insurance and Risk Management programs and provides mentoring, student roundtables and scholarships. Our agency also works closely with one of these Universities and provides internships for students. We have hired several of those young folks for permanent positions. I am hoping we can convince more of these fine students that the opportunities in the insurance industry are diverse, endless and readily available to them!
- 6. A & B: When & why did you become a volunteer leader at the CPCU Society? I got my designation in 1998. I immediately became involved in my chapter, first serving on the I-Day committee. I served on that committee for about 15 years. Over time, I got more involved in the Chapter, serving on the board for several years, serving on other various committees and served as Chapter president. I began serving on a National level when Doug Holtz, a member of my Chapter, was Society President. As to the why, I think more because of my personal desire to be involved in things.
